







EYFS Nursery to Reception

- Reception is the next developmental stage of learning following on from Nursery.
- · We continue to focus on all 7 areas of the EYFS curriculum.
- Greater emphasis is given to Literacy and Maths as we follow the guidance, 'Bold Beginnings'.
- There is great emphasis on learning through play and exploration both inside and outside the classroom.
- In Reception, we encourage children to develop their independence through the 'Characteristics of Effective Learning'.







- · Home time
































- Please check your child's book bag regularly.

- Please feel free to send us photos etc. to share too!








Learning Journey

Learning to read and write


How will my child be taught to read?

In school, we follow Read Write Inc. There are some videos to explain this in more detail, available by searching Read Write Inc online:

- What is phonics?
- Sound pronunciation.
- How to blend sounds to read words.







Group Words

Within Read, Write Inc. there are words known as Red words. These are the words which, for the majority, cannot be built up using sounds, so children are taught 'You can't Fred a red!'

We will be sending home sets of group words that will include red words. These are just for practise and we will move the children on when we feel they are ready. These will be checked in school once a week and the words will be checked in a random order.

Reading at home

To begin with, your child will be given a picture book. These are very important to develop early reading behaviours. Please look at the pictures and discuss what could be happening in the story. These will be replaced by books with words as the children progress.

The adults in the class that hear them read will consider when they are ready to move up a level and then their reading level will be assessed.

Familiar books are a key part of learning to read. Not only do they allow practise and consolidation but also increase children's confidence.

We encourage your child to read at least three times at week at home with an adult. We take part in a weekly competition to see which class has the most reads. So please remember to write in your child's yellow reading record.

PE day

• PE day is **Friday**

Children will need to come to school in their PE kit on Fridays.

This should be:

- a round neck t-shirt (red/white)
- Black shorts/bottoms
- Sensible footwear (trainers)
- Long hair tied up
- All jewellery removed inc. earrings
- If it is cold a black tracksuit





In the summer term, we may choose to do PE outside, so trainers are advisable.



Fridays

School finishes at 2pm on Fridays.

If you require for your child to stay in school until 3.15pm, they will need to be booked into Friday club. This is booked by emailing and can be done half termly or by 5pm the day before.

There is a charge of £2 per child for this.

Each class will take part, any money we raise will go towards new toys for your children in reception.








Wellbeing and the Colour monster

We are hoping that your children will come home and talk to you about The Colour Monster. The Colour Monster helps children to understand and express the confusing emotions that they sometimes feel through the use of colour.

Blue - sad and upset
Yellow - happy and cheerful
Green - calm and relaxed
Red - anger and frustration
Black - scared and anxious
Pink - love and affection
Mixed up - confused and unsure
